The city of Cordoba, as we know it today, has been shaped by the different peoples who settled there over the course of its rich history: Romans, Arabs, Jews and Christians left deep marks on its heritage, culture, customs, traditions, and even gastronomy. This is why Cordoba is a universal and multicultural city that stands open to the world, welcoming people to proudly show them its beautiful streets, squares and picturesque corners, and also its customs and traditions.

Cordoba was declared a UNESCO **World Heritage Site in 1994**, 10 years after this title was granted to the **Mosque-Cathedral in 1984**. By extending the designation to the entire **historic center**, one of the largest in Europe, **UNES-CO** acknowledged the importance of Cordoba's historic heritage as a whole.

In **December of 2012** the **Cordoba Patio Festival** was declared **Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity**, thereby recognizing not only its urban heritage but, at the same time, the importance of this popular custom in which, selflessly, the owners of the city's famed courtyards graciously open the doors of their homes to citizens and visitors alike.

Finally, in **July 2018**, the **Caliphal City of Medina Azahara** was named a **World Heritage Site**, and Cordoba became one of the few cities in the world to boast four World Heritage designations.

Cordoba is a unique tourism destination for many reasons, with singular and unique offerings of purely Cordovan roots that you will not find anywhere else. Here are 10 must-see sites during your

The city's heritage in the form of its **central historic monuments** and buildings, starting with the Mosque-Cathedral (8th century), a World Heritage Site and unique in the world for the beautiful Christian cathedral found inside the mosque; the Alcazar of the Christian Monarchs (13th century), built on Roman and Arab ruins and the site of major historical events over the centuries; Andalusia's only **Synagogue** (14th century) and one of just three remaining in Spain: Medina Azahara (10th century), the ancient caliphal city turned archaeological site that, according to legend symbolized power and love; the Mudejar Chapel of San Bartolomé (14th and 15th centuries) in the heart of the Jewish guarter, the Fernandine Churches (13th and 14th centuries) scattered throughout the city, and many other monuments that you will discover as you walk around.

Cordoba's Patios, Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity since 2012, the pride of the people of Cordoba and a stunning display of unparalleled beauty that you will never forget. Visit them not only in May, but throughout the year.

The genuine **Pure Spanish Horse**, a breed originating in Cordoba by order of King Philip II, who instructed his royal equerry to create a new breed of horse, which went on to become one of the most prized in the world. Today it can be admired in the Royal Stables (Caballerizas Reales), built in the 16th century to breed this noble animal. Don't miss one of the equestrian shows or championships held in Cordoba.



Its **museums**, which harbor priceless treasures, the **Archaeological Museum, the Julio Romero de Torres** Museum, and the Museum of Fine Arts are the most popular, but there are many others that you can visit

Orchestra of Cordoba concerts, the National Flamenco Competition, and the exhibitions at the C3A (Center for Contemporary

Festival of the Crosses, the Montilla-Moriles Wine Tasting, the Patio Festival, the Fair, and many Flamenco has its own municipal facility in Córdoba: the **Fosforito Flamenco Center.** dedicated to flamenco performances and production, research into this musical genre, and raising public awareness of it. A wonderful **Nature Destination**, including an area of great environmental value right by the historic center:

the Sotos de la Albolafia natural protected space, by the Roman bridge spanning the Guadalquivir; the mountains of Cordoba, just minutes from the city, offers many hikes on which nature lovers can discover a variety of flora and fauna; and even a unique golf course in Spain, for its location.
